Lapwai Elementary School:

English-Language Arts

Fifty percent of Lapwai Elementary School students grades K-5 will **meet or exceed expected growth** in reading (K Letter Sound) fluency as measured by Fall 2021 to Spring 2022 RCBM Benchmark Assessment.

RESULT: Students meeting or exceeding expected growth on Winter Benchmark = 59%

Math

All Lapwai Elementary classrooms grades 1-5 will meet or exceed an average **1.0 Grade Equivalent** (GE) growth as measured by Fall 2021 to Spring 2022 using the STAR MATH Assessment.

RESULT: Percent of classrooms meeting or exceeding .5 GE growth on the Winter Benchmark = 8 of 11 or 73%

PBIS

School-wide discipline referrals for the infraction of **physical aggression will decrease by 10%** from the first quarter to the fourth quarter of the 2021-2022 school year, as evidenced by data collected in the School-wide Information System (SWIS).

RESULT: Referrals decreased by 9.8% between 1st and 2nd quarter.

1st quarter: 20/63 or 31.75%

2nd quarter: 9/41 or 21.95% of all referrals

English-Language Arts

In grades 6th - 12th, 50% of students will grow at least 40 Student Growth Percentile (SGP) points or score above the 50th percentile on the NCE (Normal Curve Equivalent, aka the national average) on the STAR Spring benchmark test.

RESULT: In grades 6th - 12th, 50.7% of students grew at least 40 Student Growth Percentile (SGP) points and/or score above the 50th percentile on the NCE (Normal Curve Equivalent, aka the national average) on the STAR Spring benchmark test.

Math

In grades 6th - 11th, 50% of students will grow at least 40 Student Growth Percentile (SGP) points or score above the 50th percentile on the NCE (Normal Curve Equivalent, aka the national average) on the STAR Spring benchmark test.

RESULT: In grades 6th - 11th, 56% of students grew at least 40 Student Growth Percentile (SGP) points and/or score above the 50th percentile on the NCE (Normal Curve Equivalent, aka the national average) on the STAR Spring benchmark test.

Lapwai High School has added courses for students in grades 6-12 specifically targeting our college and career readiness objectives. Partnerships with online exploration programs through IDLA and Edmentum have greatly increased student preparation. College and Career Readiness will continue to be a priority for Lapwai High School and our programs include University of Idaho, LCSC, and the Nez Perce Tribe. Lapwai High School employees a guidance counselor and transition coordinator specially working on the goals and objectives. Dual College Credit courses are offered in SD100 and SD120 allowing 10th - 12th grade students to earn credits through LCSC and our school in career exploration and college advising.

Math Acceleration and Intervention will continue to be a focus for our leadership team, professional learning communities, and development opportunities. Middle School Math intervention in the classroom and small group instruction will be delivered daily. Students in 6th grade have reduced math class size and implemented time in the afternoon for acceleration and intervention. 6th - 8th grade math collaboration has specific times for both collaboration on curriculum and also data related to STAR and ISAT assessment.

9th-12th grade math

Grade Level math based on common core state standards will continued to be implemented in Algebra 1 / Geometry / Algebra 2 / College Math Math professionals in our building are using the standards to guide their instruction and spending time in collaboration to review the data collected during professional learning opportunities and shared preparation.
