### What is Impact Aid?

While making up for the shortfalls in state education funding, we are unable to rely on supplemental levies (raising property taxes) due to the high presence of tax exempt trust property in our district. The federal government recognizes their role in this dilemma and provides revenue in lieu of property taxes through a program called Impact Aid.

The purpose of Impact Aid is to provide formula grants to school districts affected by the presence of nontaxable federal land to make up for the lost revenues of property taxes. It is one of the few formula programs where districts receive funds directly from the U.S. Department of Education rather than through their states. Impact Aid was first signed into law by President Harry S. Truman in 1950 and has been amended many times since then.

The funds become part of local district's regular budget. No restrictions are placed on the use of the funds except for money earmarked for children with disabilities. We are responsible for educating federally connected students who live on trust property or with parents that work on trust land.

Please help us identify these students by completing Impact Aid questionnaires and surveys which will be widely distributed after November 1<sup>st</sup>.



## Help Us Hold the Federal Government Accountable for Their Obligation to Lapwai Students



Our impact aid allocation is based on the number of children who live on trust property as well as parents who work on trust land.

Beginning in November parents will be requested to complete residency and employment surveys to ensure the highest Lapwai School District allocation for Impact Aid. Your responses assist us in holding the federal government accountable to following through on their promise of ensuring a fully funded and equitable education for our students.

Impact Aid is not fully funded by the United States Government. We are currently only receiving 8.5 cents for every dollar we would receive if the program were fully supported. Your help with verification by completing the needed forms will help us hold them accountable to provide this funding obligation to all Lapwai students. Although slight raises are proposed in the House and Senate, will not be certain about increases until December at the earliest.

David Aiken also serves as the Idaho State Chair of the National Association of Federally Impacted Schools.


### U of I College of Education
