#### Tribal Health Scholars Program:


- Demonstrate mastery of medical knowledge and professionalism

## Lapwai High School Health Scholars & Native Health and Wellness Pathway

Lapwai High School has established a strong and culturally responsive Health and Wellness Pathway that supports students from middle school through high school as they explore careers in healthcare, public health, and wellness. The program integrates academic rigor, cultural identity, and hands-on experiences to build a pipeline of future Native health professionals. This semester Junee Picard, Skylin Picard, and Madden Bisbee are participating in the Tribal Health Scholars program, gaining direct experience in Native healthcare settings.

As a senior capstone, Lapwai students participate in the Native Health Scholars program, a culmination of their academic learning, cultural wellness knowledge, and real-world clinical experiences. 14 students have completed prerequisites for the Health Pathway and are actively progressing. Students are earning college credits through dual enrollment, putting them ahead as they transition to higher education.

Junee, Skylin, and Madden will be graduating high school this year as Certified Nursing Assistants. These Wildcat Scholars are proud examples of the growing dual credit and advanced opportunities in the Lapwai School District. They have been excelling in courses including Fundamentals of Health Professions, Medical Terminology, and will be participating in clinical experiences.

#### Education

Enrollment in Certified Nursing Assistant training is made available through Lewis-Clark State College and the regional DeAtley Career and Technical Education Center. Outside of the Lewiston School District, Skylin Picard is the first and only student in Region II to access the DeAtley Center.

The Lapwai School District will be breaking ground for our own career and technical education center this year. Please join us in celebrating the support of the Nez Perce Tribe as our primary industry partners with \$20,000 in Local Education Program Fund assistance. This generosity is added to a state Idaho Career Ready Students award of \$1,278,843 and a building material donation from R & M Steel in Caldwell, Idaho totaling \$66,650. The facility will expand carpentry and fabrication instruction with a long-term goal of automotive technology. Welding will remain in the current agricultural building behind the high school.







#### Thank You for Your Continued Support of Impact Aid

A team from Lapwai joined Superintendent Aiken last week to thank Idaho's Congressmen for their continued support of Impact Aid.

Impact Aid is approximately 31% of the Lapwai School District budget. 12 Idaho districts and over 14,000 Idaho students rely on this critical federal funding. Dr. Aiken also serves as the Idaho State Chair of the National Association of Federally Impacted Schools and represents all of the federally connected students and districts in Idaho.

Impact Aid is the Federal Government's reimbursement to school districts for the presence of nontaxable federal property such as military installations, Indian lands, federal low-rent housing, national laboratories, and grasslands. The presence of nontaxable property limits the ability of school districts to generate sufficient tax revenue to support growing shortfalls in K-12 education funding. Nationwide this funding supports 1,200 school districts and 10 million students.


## Help Us Hold the Federal Government Accountable for Their Obligation to Lapwai Students

Our Impact Aid allocation is based on the number of children who live on trust property as well as parents who work on trust land.

During Parent-Teacher Conferences, November 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup>, parents will be requested to complete residency and employment surveys to ensure the highest Lapwai School District allocation for Impact Aid. Your confidential responses hold the federal government accountable to their promise of ensuring a fully funded and equitable education for our students.

Impact Aid has not been fully funded since 1969, leaving \$1.05 billion in unmet needs for schools like ours across the country. On average, schools receive about 55% of what they are due. Your help with verification by completing the needed forms will assist us holding them accountable to provide this funding obligation to all Lapwai students.

These resources will make a lasting impact on student success and expand opportunities for our learners. 
