October is National Bullying Prevention Month

How does Lapwai Elementary School work to prevent bullying?



- **BEHAVIOR EXPECTA-**
 - **TIONS** are taught to all students. Bullying is not acceptable in a climate where "Be Respectful, Be Responsible, and Be Safe" is expected.
- The **PATHS** (Promoting Alternative Thinking Strategies) social and emotional learning curriculum is taught to our students twice a week. These lessons teach students how to resolve conflicts peacefully, handle emotions positively, empathize, and make responsible decisions. Bullying is greatly reduced when students empathize with others.
- STOP, WALK, TALK is taught in the classroom as well as other specific lessons about bullying (PBIS.org). Students are taught that if someone does something disrespectful or hurtful, to tell them to **STOP** and use a physical signal (palm toward the student bullying). If the problem behavior continues, students are to WALK away from the situation. Sometimes the behavior still continues, and then students are taught to **TALK** to an adult. Bystanders are encouraged to assist a peer in walking away, and not be an audience to the bullying behavior.
- Helping students to **recognize the** difference between someone being mean or rude versus bullying (intentionally aggressive behavior repeated over time, involving an imbalance of power).

Head Lice!? Oh no!

What to do?

• EVERYONE in your house needs a head check.

EVERYONE with lice needs to be treated.
 EVERYONE living in the home should be treated (lice shampoo).

- After treatment, you *MUST* use a fine-tooth comb and pick out the lice and the nits.
- TREAT AGAIN in 7 days, to kill any nits that have hatched.
- Machine wash hot *ANYTHING* that can be washed in the washer (clothing, sheets, blankets, machine washable stuffed toys), *HOT* dryer for at least 20 minutes.
- BAG UP all stuffed toys or pillows that can't be washed, keep them bagged for at least 2 weeks.
- VACUUM all floors.
- SANITIZE all hair brushes, combs, and other accessories/tools in very hot water.
- Keep long hair braided or in a bun until lice are gone.
- Continue these steps regularly until the lice are gone to avoid re-infestation.

Where can I get lice treatment?

• School office, Community Health (no cost)

treatment kit contains lice shampoo, lice combs, shower caps, laundry soap, large trash bags, instructions

Alternatives to lice shampoo:

• Tea tree, anise, and ylang ylang essential oils combined with coconut oil have been shown to be effective in repelling and killing of lice, if used every 5-10 days until lice are gone.

Prevention!

- Vinegar spray on hair (available at Community Health)
- Tea tree oil added to your shampoo and used regularly
- Avoid head-to-head contact
- Avoid sharing hats/jackets/scarves, blankets, pillows
- Keep long hair braided or in a bun while at school

Tip:

Nits (lice eggs) are tiny yellowish or grayish-white oval shaped eggs that are "glued" to the side of a hair shaft. They won't flake off easily like dandruff. They are not irregular shaped or fuzzy.
